Mental Health is a political, social, economic, family and individual topic in our society and world. Below is an opportunity for you to learn about Mental Illness and be sensitive to its complications.



We Can Help!

Family-to-Family is an educational program that is <u>FREE</u> **for family members, partners and friends** of individuals over the age of 17, who have a mental illness such as: Anxiety, Schizophrenia, Bipolar Disorder, Depression, Borderline Personality Disorder, Panic Disorder and Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD), or Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

- Is there someone in your life that has one of these illnesses?
- Have you been struggling to understand their illness and how to help them and your family to cope?

The Family-to-Family course is taught by local, trained volunteers who have family members with a mental illness. In this course you will learn about these illnesses and their treatments, how to improve communication with your loved one, solve problems, find the help you need, and take care of yourself.

Family-to-Family is a FREE, 12-session educational program.

Classes will start on Wednesday, March 21st at 6:00 p.m. (to 8:30 p.m.) in Newport

Celebrating Passover March 30 Bettie Howard's home At Sundown - 7:12pm

Passover or Pesach (<u>/'pesa:x, 'peisa:x/</u>;^[4] from Hebrew Top Pesah, Pesakh), is an important, biblically derived Jewish holiday. Jews celebrate Passover as a commemoration of their liberation by God from slavery in ancient Egypt and their freedom as a nation under the leadership of Moses. It commemorates the story of the Exodus as described in the Hebrew Bible, especially in the Book of Exodus, in which the Israelites were freed from slavery in Egypt. According to standard biblical chronology, this event would have taken place at about 1300 BCE (AM 2450). (Wikipedia)

Being raised Unitarian Universalist started for me because my mother came from a Baptist Minister's home and my father came from a Jewish home. We celebrated both Jewish and Christian holidays. Though we weren't Jewish enough to skip school for the Jewish holidays, we did celebrate my most favorite holiday, Passover. My family would gather in the Spring at my grandparent's home with paternal cousins, aunts, uncles, parents, grandparents. We all had a part in the celebration meal. This year I want to share the story of the 'miracle' of the freeing of the Jews from slavery in Egypt by Moses and God with you all.

The celebration is commemorated with unleavened bread(matzo), 4 cups of wine, bitter herbs, Elijah (you'll find out who he is) readings, songs and poems from the Haggadah. On March 30, we will be using parts of the

Passover Book that was put together by my uncle many yrs ago from my grandparent's 1942 Haggadah.

Amended Membership Statement (2016)

Membership in the Fellowship is open to all people in sympathy with its purpose and program, regardless of race, color, sex and affectional or sexual orientation.

Women in History and their rights in the human race February 20, 1805

Angelina Grimke was born in Charleston, SC, where her father was a prominent judge and slave owner. Grimke was horrified by the mistreatment of slaves that she witnessed, and in her teens, she publicly renounced materialism and devoted herself to the life of austerity and the causes of racial and gender equality. In 1829, Grimke left the South to join her older sister in Philadelphia, where the two connected with a small circle of radical abolitionists. The sisters became popular speakers and writers about slavery and women's rights. In her 1836 Appeal to the Christian Women of the Southern States, Grimke said 'I know you do not make the laws, but I also know that you are the wives and mothers, the sisters and daughters of those who do'. After its publication, police warned Mary Grimke that her daughter would be imprisoned if she ever set foot in Charleston again. (History-Women's History)

PLEDGE DRIVE BEGINS SOON!

KUUF's present church year, ending June 30, has been filled with wonderful speakers, music, events, and as much hope and joy as we could ever expect in this difficult political environment. We can all rejoice that we are moving forward, together!

Perhaps ironically, it has also been a great year for thoughtfully looking at ourselves, the KUUF congregation, as we move on without a settled minister. Our sermons have been fresh, different, often wonderful and inspiring. But last summer's congregational survey showed that many of us miss having a settled minister, one we can call our own. As a result of that survey a Transition Committee was formed to study and report on how KUUF might move from where we are, to where we want to be.

The recommendations of that Committee have been approved by the Board. They are based on the premise that growth in the size of our congregation is the only path that will lead us to the ministry many of us would like to see at KUUF. The Report has now been distributed to most of us, and you are urged to read it. Most importantly, it calls for as many excellent guest ministers as we can attract; advertise our Sunday services more broadly, to attract more visitors; and seek to hire skilled part-time administrative support for such tasks as help with advertising, monthly Newsletter and periodic special advertising , etc. In short, KUUF now has an ACTION PLAN for meeting the future! To make it work, however, we need to invest in it.

More excellent ministers and speakers will probably cost more money. Advertising, getting the word out to the broader Kearsarge community, will cost more money. Part-time administrative support to help us meet the time and skill demands our action plan will require will cost money.

Now, perhaps more than ever before, KUUF need for each of us to pledge our support as we boldly set our course into less familiar, and more expensive, waters.

Your PLEDGE PACKET will go out in about four weeks. Think excited, about the things that are in the works. And think big. Your pledge contributions will be the magic that makes it all possible!
