Every year at this time KUUF collects money from members and friends to contribute to the Andover Elementary and Middle School. For many years KUUF has donated backpacks for students; supplies for the school nurse; or money for the school's Healthy Snack Program for needy children.

This year the world is in a very different and difficult situation. Needs have changed. We do not even know what school attendance will look like in September.

This year the Social Concerns Committee recommends a different approach to help our local community. We have identified two local organizations that clearly and desperately need our help during this pandemic: The Kearsarge Lake Sunapee Community Food Pantry and KREM. KUUF has previously supported both of these organizations.

Most, if not all, KUUFer's know that our country and our world is at a critical juncture. Many of us realize that the world we hand over to our children, and their children, hangs in the balance, in this year 2020. Many of us also feel powerless to do anything about it, other than to <u>vote</u> in the upcoming elections.

Collectively, however, "we the people" have great power. Getting that power to the voting booth is the primary mission at this time for the task force. Never before in our lifetimes, and possibly never again, will the collective vote of the people be more momentous.

HISTORY OF PRIDE:

The majority of Pride events are held in June to commemorate the anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion in New York City on June 28, 1969, which most historians consider to be the birth of the modern LGBT movement. At the time, police raids on bars catering to LGBT patrons were common, but that night, the patrons of the Stonewall Inn fought back. While historical accounts of the night vary, the violent response ignited a national firestorm of activism that brought new visibility to the struggle for LGBT equality.

June is unofficially recognized as Pride Month by the LGBT community, and many Pride events still occur on the last Sunday in June to commemorate the anniversary of Stonewall. In some places Pride events stretch out over a weekend or an entire week, while in other areas, Pride events occur at different times of the year altogether.

PRIDE TODAY:

Over time, the smaller marches and gatherings organized by community members evolved into a highly organized slate of events attracting a broad range of LGBT community members and straight allies. The increasing popularity and visibility of Pride events can partially be attributed to greater levels of acceptance towards the community. While Pride events play a key role in raising the profile of the community and commemorating the history of the LGBT social movement, Pride also marks an opportunity for the community to come together, take stock and recognize the advances and setbacks made in the past year. It is also a chance for the community to come together and celebrate in a festive, affirming atmosphere.

GLAAD (formerly the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation) is an American non-governmental media monitoring organization founded by LGBT people in the media



Each of us has worth and dignity, and that worth includes our gender and our sexuality. As Unitarian Universalists (UUs), we not only open our doors to people of all sexual orientations and gender identities, we value diversity of sexuality and gender and see it as a spiritual gift. We create inclusive religious communities and work for LGBTQ justice and equity as a core part of who we are. All of who you are is sacred. All of who you are is welcome.
