This year, as last, we are met with the challenge of doing this while staying safe. COVID is surging and we all need to make sure we are still acting in safe ways. In addition to being vaccinated, wearing masks, and limiting our exposure to others, we can look for ways to reach out to others in safe ways; phone calls instead of visits, virtual visits (zoom, facetime), donations instead of in-person volunteering, and jotting a quick note to those you love and care for. For me, this "no singing" will be difficult in the next few weeks since I truly enjoy the season's music.

As Hanukkah has just started and we think about the coming week's festivities, work to rise above the commercialism and enjoy the true spirit of the Season.

### An Opportunity to Help Resettle Afghan Refugee Families

A group of Andover residents whom many of you may know (Dan Mori, Erik Cole-Johnson, Molly Leith, Gregor and Amy Makechnie and Alex Estin) have started a GoFundMe page to raise the necessary funds to apply to the State Department to bring several families of Afghan refugees to Andover or a nearby community. "We are a small group of New Hampshire Lakes Region residents who have joined together to welcome two families of Afghan refugees that need to be resettled from U.S. Military bases into our community. These refugees fled the chaos and danger of Kabul when the Taliban took over in August 2021 leaving all their possessions and extended family behind.

The U.S. State Department has started a program encouraging local U.S. residents to welcome Afghan families into their communities. These families have come to the United States "following the historic airlift and evacuation effort, Operation Allies Welcome has introduced tens of thousands of our Afghan partners to the United States."

Funds raised through this page will go towards a required fund that when complete, allows us to assist two families to resettle in our community by providing the necessities of life including housing, school supplies, household items, clothing, and fees associated with obtaining employment, drivers' licenses and utilities etc. All funds will be used within the State of New Hampshire.
