Will You Help an Afghan Family?

KUUF and other Andover Churches have been asked if we would like to be involved in helping with the resettlement of an Afghan family in Andover.

The organizing person is Michael "Dan" Mori and other folks from Proctor. Right now, they have an apartment set up but may need specific items later. The most immediate need right now is to **identify volunteers who are willing to drive the family to appointments during workdays**. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer driver you will need to:

Step 1. Register as a volunteer with WelcomeNST [here](#). Each person needs to do this. When asked how you are volunteering select "I am part of a group and would like to form an NST" and indicate you are part of "Team Andover NH"

Step 2. Every person should fill out [this form](#) to give Ascentria permission to do a background check, but it does not actually start the check.

Step 3. Then they will get an email from careers@ascentria.org which they can fill out to initiate a background check.

A Conversation Between a Science Professor and a Student

Professor: You are a Christian, aren't you, son ?

Student: Yes.

Professor: My brother died of cancer even though he prayed to GOD to heal him. Most of us would attempt to help others who are ill. But GOD didn't. How is this GOD good then? Hmm?

(Student was silent.)

Professor: You can't answer, can you ? Let's start again, young fella. Is GOD good?

Student: Yes.

Professor: Is Satan good ?

Student: No.

Professor: Where does Satan come from ?

Student: From ... GOD ...

Professor: That's right. Tell me son, is there evil in this world?

Student: Yes.

Professor: Evil is everywhere, isn't it ? And GOD did make everything. Correct?

Student: Yes.

Professor: So who created evil ?

(Student did not answer.)

Professor: Is there sickness? Immorality? Hatred? Ugliness? All these terrible things exist in the world, don't they?

Student: Yes, sir.

Professor: So, who created them ?

(Student had no answer.)

Professor: Science says you have 5 Senses you use to identify and observe the world around you. Tell me, son, have you ever seen GOD?

Student: No, sir.

Professor: Tell us if you have ever heard your GOD?

Student: No, sir.

Professor: Have you ever felt your GOD, tasted your GOD, smelt your GOD? Have you ever had any sensory perception of GOD for that matter?

Student: No, sir. I'm afraid I haven't.

Professor: Yet you still believe in Him?

Student: Yes.

Professor: According to Empirical, Testable, Demonstrable Protocol, Science says your GOD doesn't exist. What do you say to that, son?

Student: Nothing. I only have my faith.

Professor: Yes, faith. And that is the problem Science has.

Student: Professor, is there such a thing as heat?

Professor: Yes.

Student: And is there such a thing as cold?

Professor: Yes.

Student: No, sir. There isn't.

(The lecture theater became very quiet with this turn of events.)

Student: Sir, you can have lots of heat, even more heat, superheat, mega heat, white heat, a little heat or no heat. But we don't have anything called cold. We can hit 458 degrees below zero which is no heat, but we can't go any further after that. There is no such thing as cold. Cold is only a word we use to describe the absence of heat. We cannot measure cold. Heat is energy. Cold is not the opposite of heat, sir, just the absence of it.

(There was pin-drop silence in the lecture theater.)

Student: What about darkness, Professor? Is there such a thing as darkness?

Professor: Yes. What is night if there isn't darkness?

Student: You're wrong again, sir. Darkness is the absence of something. You can have low light, normal light, bright light, flashing light. But if you have no light constantly, you have nothing and it's called darkness, isn't it? In reality, darkness isn't. If it is, well you would be able to make darkness darker, wouldn't you?

Professor: So what is the point you are making, young man ?

Student: Sir, my point is your philosophical premise is flawed.

Professor: Flawed ? Can you explain how?

Student: Sir, you are working on the premise of duality. You argue there is life and then there is death, a good GOD and a bad GOD. You are viewing the concept of GOD as something finite, something we can measure. Sir, Science can't even explain a thought. It uses electricity and magnetism, but has never seen, much less fully understood either one. To view death as the opposite of life is to be ignorant of the fact that death cannot exist as a substantive thing.

Death is not the opposite of life: just the absence of it. Now tell me, Professor, do you teach your students that they evolved from a monkey?

Professor: If you are referring to the natural evolutionary process, yes, of course, I do.

Student: Have you ever observed evolution with your own eyes, sir?

(The Professor shook his head with a smile, beginning to realize where the argument was going.)

Student: Since no one has ever observed the process of evolution at work and cannot even prove that this process is an on-going endeavor. Are you not teaching your opinion, sir? Are you not a scientist but a preacher?

(The class was in uproar.)

Student: Is there anyone in the class who has ever seen the Professor's brain?

(The class broke out into laughter.)

Student: Is there anyone here who has ever heard the Professor's brain, felt it, touched or smelt it? No one appears to have done so. So, according to the established Rules of Empirical, Stable, Demonstrable Protocol, Science says that you have no brain, sir. With all due respect, sir, how do we then trust your lectures, sir?

(The room was silent. The Professor stared at the student, his face unfathomable.)

Professor: I guess you'll have to take them on faith, son.

Student: That is it sir ... Exactly ! The link between man & GOD is FAITH. That is all that keeps things alive and moving.

That student was EINSTEIN.

Boston Creates Office of LGBTQ+ Advancement

Mayor Michelle Wu announced the creation of an Office of LGBTQ+ Advancement, tasked with developing policies and programs to empower Bostonians in those communities.

City officials are seeking an executive director to lead the new office and aim to have two full-time employees by fiscal year 2023. Previously, Boston had several LGBTQ+ liaisons under the Office of Neighborhood Services umbrella. Mayor Wu said the creation of a new department, amid a “growing movement to strip away rights that the queer community has fought and waited so long for” will scale up efforts to provides services to those communities.

More than 20 other states have seen "anti-LGBTQ+ legislation" introduced so far in 2022, according to Wu, who said many of the proposals "specifically target the trans community."

"Too often, government has really overlooked the needs of the most vulnerable people in our community," Sen. Julian Cyr, a Truro Democrat, said. "Yes, this is Boston, and yes, this is Massachusetts. We're proud, I think, of what we've done, but I really worry that we've been resting on our laurels when it comes to the LGBTQ+ community."
